

Read this manual carefully before you use this machine and keep it handy for future reference. For safe and correct use, be sure to read the Precautions in this manual before using the machine.

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Precautions



Follow all warnings, precautions and maintenance as recommended in this user's guide to maximize the life of your unit.

Warning-

Indicates a potentially hazardous situation which, if instructions are not followed, could result in death or serious injury.

• Caution-Indicates a potentially hazardous situation which, if instructions are not followed, may result in minor or moderate injury or damage to property.

- Warning- Do not use flammable sprays or solvents in the vicinity of this machine. Also, avoid placing these items in the vicinity of this machine. Doing so could result in fire or electric shock.
- Warning- Do not place vases, plant pots, cups, toiletries, medicines, small metal objects, or containers holding water or any other liquids, on or close to this machine. Fire or electric shock could result from spillage or if such objects or substances fall inside this machine.
- Warning- Keep the machine and attachments out of the reach of children. If the machine is near children, it may cause injury.

Warning-If metal objects, or water or other fluids fall inside this machine, you must turn off its power immediately.

Contact your sales or service representative if you want to install the projector on a wall or ceiling. f) For sales or service representatives:

- Use bracket or ceiling mount that is strong enough to support the projector. RICOH PJ WUL6670/ WUL6680/WUL6690 Series weight is approx. 14kg. - The projector must be installed in a location that is sturdy enough to support the full weight of the projector and brackets. Make sure the screws are tightened.

Use only the screws (M4 screws). Use all four of the projector's screw holes to attach the brackets.
g) Do not use the projector in oil-mist or smoke environment. Doing so may cause the projector case to crack and fall from its ceiling mount. This may cause serious injury.

- Warning- Do not use lens cap when projector is powered on.
- Caution- Keep the machine away from humidity and dust. Otherwise a fire or an electric shock might occur.
- Caution- Do not place any objects on the machine. Doing so may cause the machine to topple over, possibly resulting in injury.
- Caution- Do not place the machine on an unstable or tilted surface. If it topples over, an injury might occur.
- Caution- Do not place the machine or use it in an environment where it might get wet such as from snow, rain, or being near water. Doing so could result in fire or electric shock.








Caution- For 360° installation, install the projector more than 1m away from the ceiling, the floor and the wall on the left side or on the right side.

ABOUT THE LASER LIGHT SOURCE

Warning-	Do not look into the lens or vent when the product is on. The bright light may damage your eyes. Be especially careful in an environment with children.

REMOTE CONTROL BATTERY

Warning




Safety Labels of This Machine

The IR remote allows individual addressing of projectors. The projector can be set with a specific number from "1" to "99" as its address, and it only responds to the IR remote set to the same ID code. ID code "0" is the default value of the IR remote, and all projectors will respond to the IR remote set to "0".

Follow below methods to set up the IR remote:

99	Press "ID" for 3 seconds, when the backlight turns on, hold "ID" and press "9", then "9".

To have the IR remote return to the default state where all projectors can be controlled, press "ID" for "3" seconds, when the backlight turns on, hold "ID" and press "0", then "0".


Remote Control Battery Installation

The figure below shows the procedure for installing the battery. To remove the battery, reverse the procedure.

- 1 Remove the battery cover on the back of the remote control.
- 2 Install new batteries (AAA/ R03).

Ensure that you have the batteries' polarity (+/-) aligned correctly. 3 Close the battery cover and press it down until it clicks into place.

Do not mix different types of batteries or new and old batteries.




To ensure safe operation, please observe the following precautions :

- Use AAA/R03 type battery.
- Avoid contact with water or liquid.
- Do not expose the remote control to moisture or heat.
- Do not drop the remote control.
- If the battery has leaked in the remote control, carefully wipe the case clean and install new battery.
- Risk of an explosion if battery is replaced by an incorrect type.
- Dispose of used battery according to the instructions.
- Remove batteries from remote control when not using for extended periods.
- The remote control may fail to operate if the infrared remote sensor is exposed to bright sunlight or fluorescent lighting.

Point the remote control toward the projector (Remote Receiver) when pressing any button. Maximum operating range for the remote control is about 6m and $\pm 30^{\circ}$ in front and top of the projector.




Installing the Projector

When you select a position for the projector, consider the size and shape of your screen, the location of your power outlets, and the distance between the projector and the rest of your equipment. Follow these general guidelines:

- Position the projector on a flat surface at a right angle to the screen.
- Position the projector to the desired distance from the screen. The distance from the lens of the projector to the screen, the zoom setting, and the video format determine the size of the projected image.
- When using a LAN, use the network separated by a firewall to prevent unauthorized access from the Internet.
- Pay careful attention to the installation location, management of the devices, and the network device to which the device is connected in order to prevent malicious third parties from viewing the communication data.





Connecting HDBaseT

The HDBaseT connection facilitates communication of uncompressed HD multimedia contents. Using an HDBaseT transmitter (sold separately) makes it possible to connect multiple signals to the unit over an HDBaseT connection.





 The illustration is for reference purpose only, and actual layout may vary.

- HDBaseT transmitter
- Use a shielded LAN cable of CAT5e or better, with a length of up to 100 meters.
- Although the maximum communication distance is specified as 100 meters, it may be shorter for practical purposes in some cases.



Warning Indicator

When the Temp indicator lights red, it indicates the projector has overheated. The projector will automatically shut itself down.



When the Temp indicator flashes red and the Power / Status indicator lights red and the message below displays, it indicates the cooling fan failed. Stop using the projector and disconnect the power cord from the electrical outlet, then contact your local dealer or our service center.








The projector is equipped with rear and front adjustable feet to raise and lower the image to fill the screen.

- 1. Locate the adjustable foot you wish to modify on the underside of the projector.
- 2. Rotate the adjustable ring clockwise to raise the projector or counter clockwise to lower it. Repeat with the remaining feet as necessary.





The projection lens can be moved up, down, right, and left with the motor-driven lens shift function. This function makes the positioning of images easy on the screen. Lens shift is generally expressed as a percentage of the image height or width, see below illustration.






 Distance (D) is the distance from the tip of the lens to the screen.



The Projector has a multilingual On Screen Display that allows you to make image adjustments and change a variety of settings.

How to operate

- 1. To open the OSD, press "Menu" on the Control Panel or Remote Control.
- When OSD is displayed, use ▲ ▼ keys to select any item in the main menu. While making a selection on a particular page, press "Enter" key to enter sub menu.
- Use ▲ ▼ keys to select the desired item in the sub menu and press "Enter" key to view further settings. Adjust the settings by using ◀▶ key or ▲ ▼ key.
- 4. Select the next item to be adjusted in the sub menu and adjust as described above.
- 5. Press "Return (Exit)", and the screen will return to the previous menu.
- Press "Return (Exit)" key repeatedly to return to the main menu or close the OSD menu or press "Menu" key, the OSD menu will close.







Using Blending function


Step 1

Using the Blending function can reduce the distinct appearance of joining portions between two screens when connecting images from multiple projectors.

Horizontally connecting images from two projectors positioned to the left and right, shown within the red frame, for image signals described below, is explained.

The same signal will be input to the two projector units. As shown below, this is useful when the HDMI signal from the HDMI input signal source is connected to terminal of Projector 1 and the HDMI output terminal of Projector 1 is connected to the HDMI input terminal of Projector 2. A signal distributor can also be used to input the same signal.

The overlapping portion of the two images must be at least 10% of the image width of one unit. (Approximately 20% is recommended.)





 Blending reduces the sharpness of the image when compared to before compensating.

Step 2

Set the magnification ratio of Projector 1. In the OSD menu, select [Screen] \rightarrow [Advanced] \rightarrow [Magnify] \rightarrow [H.Magnify] and set the magnification ratio for the horizontal direction. The magnification ratio is set with a percentage value (%), therefore the adjustment must be made to ensure "number of horizontal units x 100 - overlapped portions (%)".

Similarly, [V.Magnify] must be set to ensure that the value is same as that of [H.Magnify] so that images are not displayed with an unnatural vertical and horizontal ratio.

Also, in the OSD menu, select [Screen] \rightarrow [Advanced] \rightarrow [Magnify] \rightarrow [V. Position] and adjust the image to ensure that the left side of the projected image is displayed.

The image from Projector 2 will be as shown below.



Step 3

Set [H.Magnify], [V.Magnify] and [V. Shift] of Projector 2 to values that are identical to those of Projector 1.

Next, in the OSD menu, select [Screen] \rightarrow [Advanced] \rightarrow [Magnify] \rightarrow [V. Position] and adjust the image to ensure that the right side of the projected image is displayed.

The image from Projector 2 will be as shown below.







÷. In the event the position of the overlapped portion cannot be adjusted completely and the overlapped appearance cannot be resolved, use [Grid Adjustment] to adjust positions of grid intersections. This makes it possible to reduce overlapping so that it is hardly visible.

 Displaying a screen with grids (such as an empty Excel worksheet) from a PC can make it easier to conduct adjustments to perform [Grid Adjustment]. In such instances, the entire screen is not visible and operation may become difficult, in which case connecting a monitor to the HDMI Out of Projector 2 is convenient.

Displaying a black screen shows overlapped portions more brightly. There is no adjustment function available for black levels, so it is not possible to reduce this effect.


Step 4

Adjust the positions of the two projectors, lens shift, and zoom to ensure that the overlapped projected image from both projectors overlaps completely and the overlap is not as visible.

Once the adjustments are completed, projected images will have overlapped portions that are displayed as bright images.

Adjust the width for the Blending function next. Adjusting this feature gradually darkens the overlapped portions and makes the overlapped portions less obvious.

Adjust the right side of the screen for Projector 1 and the left side of the screen for Projector 2 to adjust the Blending Widths to the overlapped portions.

Troubleshooting

Problem: No image appears on screen

- Ensure all the cables and power connections are correctly and securely connected as described in the "Connecting the Projector" section.
- Ensure the pins of terminals are not crooked or broken.
- Make sure the projector is switched on.
- Ensure that the "AV Mute" feature is not turned on.

Problem: Partial, scrolling or incorrectly displayed image

- Press "Auto" on the remote control.
- Adjust the computer display settings. Verify the resolution setting is less than or equal to 1600 x 1200 (3840 x 2160 for HDMI) resolution. See your operating system's Help file.
- If you experience difficulty changing resolutions or your monitor freezes, restart all equipment including the projector.

Problem: Image is out of focus

- Press the "Focus ▲" or "Focus ▼" button on the remote control or projector keypad to adjust the focus until the image is sharp and legible.
- Make sure the projection screen is between the required distance from the projector. Refer to pages 40-42.
- If Keystone correction, 4-point correction, Magnify, etc. are performed, the image will not be clear compared to before correction. This is due to digital signal processing and is not a malfunction.



Troubleshooting



Operating the projector while having dust and dirt at the ventilation inlet cause of the laser units failed on event, or failure of the projector due to the excessive temperature rise inside the main body.
